he Multi-Commodity Education Program was launched October, 2006, when producers from the Midwest/Far West traveled to North Carolina to observe cotton production/processing and other agricultural operations. The schedule was developed in conjunction with local producer organizations and leadership.

Then in August, 2007, a group of Sunbelt growers saw agricultural production/processing and agribusiness operations in North Dakota. The tour was arranged by the North Dakota Grain Growers Association.

The Multi-Commodity Education Program is supported by The Cotton Foundation with grants from Deere & Company and Monsanto. NCC's Member Services is responsible for program management.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Provide current and emerging leaders an opportunity to better understand conditions and challenges faced by their peers in other geographic regions.
- Provide an opportunity for participants to meet their counterparts in other geographic regions to gain a better understanding, through first hand observation and discussion, of agronomic practices, technology utilization, cropping patterns, marketing plans, and operational structure.
- Observe production, harvesting, and processing of various crops in the areas visited.
- Visit research facilities, processing operations and other facilities of interest and relevance to the local economy.
- Provide John Deere and Monsanto with an opportunity to establish stronger relationships with producers who are current and future leaders.





PARTICIPANTS



- Identified by cooperating organizations which represent a diverse group of commodities.
- Must derive their primary livelihood from production agriculture.
- Must agree to spend approximately one week away from home; participate in all activities and; submit completed evaluations, reports, etc.
- There is no age limit.
 Program participation is limited to participants, sponsors, hosts and support staff.
- All expenses related to travel and participation in group activities will be covered by The Cotton Foundation.
